First Families of Defiance County and Centennial Families

<u>Defiance County First</u> Families

If you can prove your ancestor resided in Defiance County before January 1846, your ancestor can be classified as a "Pioneer." If he or she lived here between January 1846 and December



1860, that ancestor can be classified as a "Settler." To prove your lineage back to your ancestor, you may use birth records, death records, marriage licenses, census records, Bible records, and other primary or supportive secondary records.

The application fee is \$15.00 which covers as many ancestors as you can prove and also covers your membership pin. You must be a member of the Defiance County Chapter OGS. This membership may be paid at the same time as your application fee is paid. The cutoff date is August 1st of the year in which you apply. 



Hicksville Township and the Village of Hicksville

. Hicksville Township lies in the southwest corner of Defiance County. It was organized in June 1839. The Hicks Land Company and the American Land Company were primarily responsible for tis early settlement. The hicks Land company had owned 14,000 acres of land and the American Land Company 4,000 acres. All of the lands of the Hicks Land Company were entered in 1835-1830 in the names of Henry W. Hicks and Isaac S. Smith, who were allied with steamboat ownership and merchants from New York.

Among the earliest settlers in the township on the Fort Wayne Road were David Landis, Mark W. Babb, William Hollinger, and Nelson Tustason. On the Newville Road were Alonzo Works, Ezra Dickson, James Thomas, Luther Loveland, Lewis Michaells and High J. Marcellus. On the Edgerton Road were Allen Pearson, David Blain, Joshua Hall, Isaac Miller, and Isaac Wartenbe. On the Bryan Road were Buenos Ayers, David Grier, John Ryan, Ebenezer Johnson, Casper Ginter, and Thomas McCurdy

Hicksville Village

Although the village was not incorporated until 1871, the first school was taught by Ransom Osborn in 1836. The first mayor was Thomas C. Kinmont.

Early churches in the area were the Union Presbyterian Church organized in Farmer Township in 1848, the Hicksville Presbyterian Church organized May 12, 1855, the First Presbyterian Church was built in 1858, the Protestant Episcopal Church was opened in 1873, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Lutheran Church, the Christian Church, and the Catholic Church.

An Active GAR (Grand Army of the Republic), the i. Donafin Post, was organized on April 1881. Beginning on page 284 of the 1883 History is a listing of members and the units in which they fought during the Civil War.





Highland Township and Aversville

Highland Township is located in the extreme southeast of the county. It was organized in 1842. There are two sandy ridges running through the township. Powell Creek drains the southwest corner.

The first election (when Highland was still a part of Henry County) was held December 18, 1843. Township officers elected were Trustees-John M. Sanford, Philip G. Hoeltzel, and Henry Brechbill. Treasurer elected was Brazilla Hendrix; Clerk, Jacob Kraft; Overseers of the Poor, William Boucher, Augustus Skiver, and John Wiler; Fence Viewers, Jacob T. Peterson and David Skiver.


Ayersville Village

Ayersville was not a platted village; however, as early as 1849 there was a post office. The village was named after Joseph Ayers. In 1883 there was one store with the post office which was owned by Nathan Boutell. Other enterprises were one doctor, an Episcopal Methodist Church, a school house, a blacksmith shop, a saw mill, and Grange No. 369. The church, having a congregation of about 75, was built in 1860 at a cost of \$700. Other denominations present in the area are the German Evangelical Lutheran, Presbyterian, New School Baptist, Free-Will Baptist, and Dunkard
